Since the 16th century Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. Pope Leo XIII personally started the practice of devoting October to the Rosary devotion. In a letter of September 1, 1883, mindful of the Rosary's power to strengthen faith and foster a life of virtue, he outlined the triumphs of the Rosary in past times and admonished the faithful to dedicate the month of October to the Blessed Virgin through the daily recitation of her Rosary in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, in order to obtain through her intercession the grace that God would console and defend His Church in her sufferings.

Knights Founder Fr. Michael J. McGivney Once "Venerable" to Become "Blessed" Through Beatification

One step closer to Sainthood, Knights of Columbus founder the Venerable Father Michael J. McGivney will be "Blessed" Father Michael J. McGivney on October 31,2020. The Beatification Mass will take place at The Cathedral of St. Joseph, Hartford, Connecticut.

The Order of The Knights of Columbus was founded by Fr. McGivney March, 1882 in New Haven, Connecticut. Father McGivney lived a very short life (38 years) dying from complications of pneumonia. His work as founder of the Knights of Columbus cannot be measured in dollars and cents, but by the faith and actions each Knight demonstrates in all of our activities.

Safe Environment RENEWAL TRAINING

Annual Online Training: "Renewing Our Commitment"

The Diocese of Phoenix is committed to protecting all children and youth by offering, at all Diocesan parishes, several abuse prevention educational sessions. The Diocesan Policy and Procedure for the Protection of Minors requires all clergy, employees, volunteers that directly serve minors, and minors to attend training on an annual basis. All other volunteers in the parish must attend Safe Environment training every other year. In Catholic education grades Pre-k through high school, every student every year participates in a Safe Environment program.

In the Diocese of Phoenix all adult volunteers must complete Called to Protect for Ministries as a foundation course for Safe Environment. Called to Protect for Ministries is a 3 hour program which will teach steps that can be taken to prevent child sexual abuse and as a component of the training everyone is required to complete a volunteer application and Code of Ethics.

A 45 minute renewal Training is offered for all subsequent years. This training is offered through inclass sessions at the parish or through computer "online" training.



In A Word...

[We] will never be favorably inclined to a plotting intriguing partybut faith and holiness are irresistible.-St. John Henry Newman

In 1841 in a letter to a friend Newman, while acknowledging his growing doubts about the Church of England, laid out a challenge to the Church of Rome, the Catholic Church, to display signs of holiness which he found lacking at this point on his journey to conversion, seeing in her a somewhat sinister political party. He seems to echo the words of the Psalmist; *I have hated the church of the malignant, and with the wicked I will not sit.(Ps. 25:5)*

October 11th marks the 58th anniversary of the beginning of the Second Ecumenical Council of the Vatican, an anniversary which should be marked, if truth is still matters, by its' near unspotted record of destruction of the Catholic Church. You know the statistics; baptisms down, conversions down, vocations down, marriages down, at least the ones the pre-Vatican II Church would actually recognize and bless, and, following 50 years of the treasured Novus Ordo, a church where 70% of Catholics don't believe in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist! The church militant, the one waging eternal war with the world the flesh and the devil has largely fled the field, led ignominiously by her commanders, the priests the bishops and at times, it is sad to say, the Pope. By their attempts to make the church pleasing to the world and all her "movements" and "ideologies" they have taken the barque of Saint Peter and turned it into a decadent cruise ship.

The Church, the Council of Trent reminds us, includes within her fold the good and the bad. They profess the same faith and participate in the same sacraments, yet differ in their manner of life and morality. That this is true, even of Her ministers, should shock no one. What is troubling is the degree to which many who lead the Church are willing to find so much of what we know to be evil, excusable. That it should be controversial when a priest refuses communion to a prominent "catholic" politician who advocates for abortion but there is no controversy when the Bishop of El Paso kneels in prayer holding a sign which reads *Black Lives Matter* is troubling to say the least. This addle-brained move based on a misguided romantic notion of black lives matter as some sort of civil rights organization will, no doubt, stand him in good stead with the twin pillars of vice and crime; celebrity culture and the mass media. Can a cardinal's hat be far behind? Two days later he received a call from Pope Francis expressing his admiration for the gesture. One might ask both prelates what among this organization's stated aims do they support; abortion, gender expression, transgenderism, fostering a "queer affirming network", the end of the "nuclear family structure"...? What we might ask became of the social and moral order established upon the principles of Christianity?

The Church has but one ruler and one governor, the invisible one, Christ, whom the eternal Father hath made head over all the Church, which is his body. (Eph. 1:22-23) Saint Basil remind us that: ... [Peter] although a rock, he is not such a rock as Christ; for Christ is truly an immovable rock, but Peter only by virtue of that rock. The pope is rock when he speaks in communion with Christ. The Pope can never adapt Church teaching to the modern "needs" of each new age. It is in Her unchanging doctrine that the Church has attracted every manner of convert throughout the ages, a doctrine which rebukes sin and saves the sinner, it raises up the unbeliever, those who are too worldly. The world however, Chesterton tells us, "has no adequate rebuke for a Church grown too worldly."

The world will not flock to a church which will not display faith and holiness. For, without faith it is impossible to please God. (Heb. 11:6) We need a Church which teaches a faith in which we "yield our entire assent to whatever has been divinely revealed." A Church from which "we learn the example of holiness and recognizes its model and source in the all-holy Virgin Mary" (CCC 2030). A Church in which both laity and clergy heed the call to witness. The kind of witness Whittaker Chambers wrote about, one "whose life and faith are so completely one that when the challenge comes to step out and testify for his faith, he does so, disregarding all risks, accepting all consequences." We have far too many hypocrites mouthing pieties while applauding all manner of sacrilege. We must find men steadfast in faith and willing to display that holiness St. John Henry Newman found irresistible. We must encourage such men, we must become such men, and soon. If we do not the state may finally achieve her goal, spoken of since the time of the Caesars, of finally eradicating the superstitious cult of Christianity.

For those already afflicted, we ask you to obtain the grace of healing and deliverance. Hear the cries of those who are vulnerable and fearful,


wipe away their tears and help them to trust.

When you are unable to receive Holy Communion, you can make an Act of Spiritual Communion. To do so express your faith in Christ and in His Presence in the Eucharist, and ask Him to unite Himself with you. The basic elements of an Act of Spiritual Communion are an Act of Faith, an Act of Love, a desire to receive Christ, and an invitation to Him to come into your heart.

The following text presents a popular form of an Act of Spiritual Communion written by St. Alphonsus de Liguori. Simply face the Tabernacle if you are in a Church or Chapel or, if at home, face the direction of the closest Church.

My Jesus,

I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament.

I love You above all things,

and I desire to receive You into my soul.

Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.



Join Bishop Olmsted in Praying a 54-Day Rosary Novena for Our Nation August 30 - October 22

ishop Olmsted invites all Catholics in the Diocese of Phoenix and throughout the nation to pray together a "Totus Tuus" 54-Day Rosary Novena, beginning on August 30, the memorial of St. Jeanne Jugan, foundress of the Little Sisters of the Poor, and ending on October 22, the feast of St. John Paul II.

How to pray the Novena:

As a family, or as an individual, simply pray these intentions before praying the daily Rosary. The Rosary is prayed every day of the Novena.

Please pray for the following intentions:

- 1. For the conversion and spiritual protection of our nation, currently experiencing a calamity of sin, division, and vitriol.
- 2. For authentic leadership, secular and in the Church, rooted in true virtue.
- 3. For the political parties of our nation to be led by the common good, and to agree on the funda-

mentals of any nation with a future: protection of human life at all stages, recognition of the dignity of every human person precisely because he or she is made in the image of God, upholding of marriage as the fundamental building block of society, and protection of free speech, freedom of religion, and all other attendant freedoms which help build a virtuous and generous citizenry.

4. For the rejection of all forms of collectivism (CCC 1885), whether Marxist or born of another false ideology, and the cultivation of true patriotism, based on love for what is best in our country, solidarity with those in need and subsidiarity for those smaller stations of governance such as the family.





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- 5. For the strengthening of all families, in particular that Catholic families live more deeply their call to be the "domestic church".
- 6. For the virtues of mercy and forgiveness to be demonstrated by our leaders and especially those who pray the Our Father.
- 7. For an end to unjust discrimination and the healing of racial divisions and all other divisiveness unworthy of a sovereign nation.
- 8. For the vulnerable among us, especially pre-born children, elderly, immigrants, unemployed and the poor.
- 9. For the restoration of one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice
