

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

# Ervin James (Jim) McGrath

Ervin J. (Jim) McGrath departed peacefully on January 14, 2021. Jim was raised in Cold Spring, Kentucky. He graduated from St. Thomas High School, Fort Thomas, Kentucky and attended Thomas More college. He was also active in the Navy Reserves for eight years after high school.

Jim and Joan, his wife of 63 years, moved to Phoenix, Arizona in March, 1988. Together they raised nine children. Jim worked in the supermarket industry for Kroger, A & P, Super Value and Fleming Foods. In addition to his full time work during the mid 1970s, he was in charge of night and weekend duty serving as assistant Police Chief of the Highland Heights, Kentucky Police Department. In 1975, while working for Kroger, we accepted a transfer to their facility in Louisville, Kentucky. One year later, Jim was later transferred to Kroger's Solon, Ohio facility where he held the position of Meat Merchandising Manager.

He was a tireless worker, devoted husband and father. After working for several years at Fleming Foods in Phoenix, Jim joined the real estate industry working for Pulte Homes in south Chandler, AZ/ Jim was also an author of several books that were written and published in his later years. A proud parishioner at Corpus Christi Catholic Church in Phoenix, he served as a Lector, Sacristan, Eucharistic Minister and commentator. He also wrote the weekly Knights' column in the Parish bulletin. He was a member of the first Pastoral Council at Corpus Christi Catholic Church. Jim was a Charter Member of the Knights of Columbus Council 10062 where he served for many years in various roles including Grand Knight and Faithful Navigator of San Xavier del Bac Assembly 14. He was most proud to profess Patriotism as a member of the Fourth Degree Honor Guard.

Jim leaves behind his wife Joan (Rasche) and his loving children: Monica of Cape Coral, Florida; Debbie Davis of Canton, Ohio: Peggy Ashba of Geneva, Ohio; Sons, Douglas of Akron, Ohio; Gary (Maureen) of Mableton, Georgia; James of Kettering, Ohio; Kevin of Apopka, Florida, Florida and Brian of Phoenix, Arizona. Jim also leaves behind grandchildren Hannah, Jackson And Colin McGrath and James Davis. One great-grandchild, Nicole. I have been a member of the Knights of Columbus for a dozen years, brought into this brotherhood by well meaning men to whom I had never done any harm. Jim McGrath, God bless him, was not one of them. He was however, for all these years, a guiding light.

Jim was one of the first of our council to take a role in introducing me to men I now refer to as brothers and by virtue of his esteem within the council I was made to feel welcome as not just a newbie but a long time member. It was his way of mentoring, understanding the value to others who might be somewhat overwhelmed by what they had just gotten themselves into.

Jim was ubiquitous, seeming to be everywhere at once, always there to offer advice and assistance to anyone who would ask knowing as he did every intimate detail of this our council. A founding member, he attended seemingly every initiation ceremony often the only guest there to greet new members. He was at one time, sometimes two, the holder of every chair in both council and assembly. His importance in these roles was known to anyone who tried to fill them. Often, while filling these same chairs, unsure of the steps I was about to take, I would turn to Jim to find out if I was doing the right thing. His advice was unerringly correct.

Jim not only did all these things, he did them long after any lingering sense of obligation might hold one. It is worth bearing in mind that none of the things we do as knights is a necessity to our physical existence. If we fold the council tomorrow, life would go on. So why did he do it? Why should we? Because he was, as each of us should be, a servant of God, called as St. Paul tells us, "to do good, to be rich in good deeds, liberal and generous." It was a spirit of charity that can never be expressed, as too many in our secular world seem to believe, in the mere distribution of money. He did it because it was his council; he loved it and he loved us.

When you are Grand Knight there is a template you must follow to facilitate each meeting. At one point it says **Lecturer/Chaplain's Report.** For the first several months, not seeing our Chaplain next to me, I would skip over this part. A gentle clearing of the throat from Jim would remind me that the lecturer *was* there. Finally, so as not to forget, I entered; **THIS IS THE POINT WHERE JIM MCGRATH SPEAKS!** 

Thus, by his example to me, through all these memories which touch my heart, my absent friend speaks.





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# Safe Environment RENEWAL TRAINING

Annual Online Training: "Renewing Our Commitment"

The Diocese of Phoenix is committed to protecting all children and youth by offering, at all Diocesan parishes, several abuse prevention educational sessions. The Diocesan Policy and Procedure for the Protection of Minors requires all clergy, employees, volunteers that directly serve minors, and minors to attend training on an annual basis. All other volunteers in the parish must attend Safe Environment training every other year. In Catholic education grades Pre-k through high school, every student every year participates in a Safe Environment program.

In the Diocese of Phoenix all adult volunteers must complete Called to Protect for Ministries as a foundation course for Safe Environment. Called to Protect for Ministries is a 3 hour program which will teach steps that can be taken to prevent child sexual abuse and as a component of the training everyone is required to complete a volunteer application and Code of Ethics.

A 45 minute renewal Training is offered for all subsequent years. This training is offered through inclass sessions at the parish or through computer "online" training.





# Bishop Olmsted's Statement on the Inauguration of President Biden January 20, 2021

The Most Rev. Thomas J. Olmsted, Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Phoenix, <u>released today the following statement</u> on the inauguration of President Biden:

Today I join in prayer with Archbishop Gomez for President Biden as he begins his role as President of the United States. Hetakes on this task amid many troubles and tensions in our culture and world. It is my firm hope that the God who speaks to every humanheart will strengthen him and give him wisdom for the years ahead.


I gratefully support Archbishop Gomez's statement to President Biden, which speaks powerfully to our role as bishops and, more fundamentally, Catholics in this historic moment. Indeed, as bishops we are committed to work with every elected official and government beyond partisan dichotomies for the good of our brothers and sisters across the country. There likely will be strong diagreements and shared passionate goals with President Biden and his administration, as there has been with every administration, but I pray that this work will be fruitful. As did the Good Samaritan, Christ humbled Himself and came into our world to care for the broken and defenseless. So, we, as His followers, desire to labor side by side with all people of goodwill to anoint a wounded world with the oil of love and the wine of fraternity.

Rooted in the Good News that Christ died and rose again, confident that this power of new life is still at work in the world, we proclaim the truths that He has revealed through His Word and His Church with the integrity required of this role. "Thus, should one regard us: as servants of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God" (1 Cor 4:1). So as we engage with secular authorities and teach our people, we seek to offer guiding principles and form consciences that our work may be truly that of healing.


Essential in these principles is the right to life of every human person. The tragedy of abortion remains for the U.S. bishops the "preeminent priority," for the dignity of the human person is damaged at every level of this act. Millions of unborn lives have been lost, women scarred, and families broken. This damage is happening at a higher rate in minority communities and for those children that would be born with disabilities. Thus, our desire for fraternity and solidarity demands that we call for justice for allwho have suffered and all who are at risk from abortion.

Therefore, it is my prayer and sincere request that President Biden hear the cry of the poor and work with Church leaders tocraft just policies that respect the right to life, the needs of parents, and the essential role that families play in the health of our country. Healing is possible. If we can work together in the light of Jesus Christ, His grace will be sufficient to bring new life to a fractured and alienated people.

Entrusting ourselves into the hands of our Heavenly Father who probes every mind and heart, we commit ourselves again to prayer and cooperation. May the Lord in His love and goodness guide President Biden with His grace that he may strive to build up the common good of all people, especially the most vulnerable, in our country.
